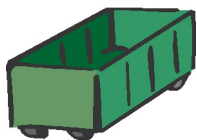

Cook's Corner



Broccoli-Cheddar Soup for Two

- 1/3 cup chopped onion (80 ml)
- 1/3 cup sliced celery (80 ml)
- 1/4 cup (1/2 stick) butter (60 ml)
- 1/4 cup flour (60 ml)
- 1 (10 ounce) can chicken broth (280 g)
- 1-1/2 cups milk or half & half cream (360 ml)
- 1 (14 oz) package frozen chopped broccoli, thawed, cooked (280 g)
- 2/3 cup shredded cheddar cheese (160 ml)

* Saute onion and celery in butter in large saucepan. Stir in flour and salt and pepper to taste. Cook and stir constantly until smooth.

* Add broth and milk and cook, while stirring, until mixture thickens. Add drained broccoli and simmer, stirring constantly, until mixture is thoroughly hot. Remove from heat, add cheese and stir until cheese melts.

"Do you believe in life after death?" the Boss asked his employee.

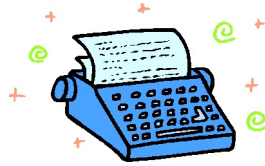

Seasonal Water Tips



Spring and Summer months are a time when we take pride in our lawns and gardens, resulting in an increase in the demand for water. Here’s how you can water efficiently:

- *Don’t over water your lawn. A healthy lawn only needs 1.5-3 cm of water once per week, including rainfall
- * Only water your lawn in the early morning or evening
- * Raise your lawn mower’s blade level to 6-9 cm
- * Don’t apply fertilizer (nitrogen) in the summer - new growth needs more water
- * Plant native, drought-resistant plants
- * Place a layer of mulch around trees and plants to slow the evaporation of moisture and discourage weed growth.

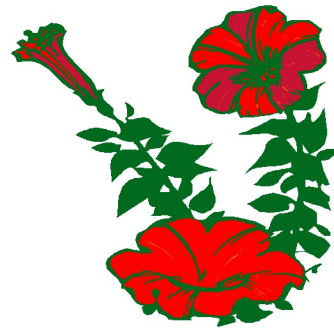
